GRAFFITI IS NOT ART: IT'S A CRIMINAL ACT!

Remove all graffiti within parish boundaries and keep it that way. That is one of the major aims of Great Linford Parish Council.

A survey of graffiti has been carried out by Councillors to find out just how much of a problem graffiti is within the Parish. The results of the survey were passed to MK Council who, with persuasion from Parish Manager Jenny Sharp, made a determined effort to clean up most of the areas outlined. These include telephone boxes, road signs, and the road abutments over canal bridges, and so on.

The challenge, however, is to keep it that way. As one observer noted: 'There is a fashionable idea that painting on walls and public areas is a form of self-expression'. That view is not shared by the Parish Council. "Graffiti is not art – it is criminal damage," said Councillor David Stabler.

The Parish Council, and many residents, feel that an area defaced with slogans, and offensive ones at that, looks as if the people who live there do not care.

Graffiti is an ongoing challenge for the Parish but one that residents can help to combat, by reporting graffiti when they see it so that others are not encouraged to do the



same. To some people, a wall with a slogan is an invitation to add some more.

Yet, it is not just the unsightliness of graffiti that is offensive; there is also a price to pay in removing it. Great Linford Parish Council has one of the lowest rate charges of all

parish councils in the city area, and one way of keeping that rate down is by being vigilant about graffiti.

Residents can report incidents to the special Graffiti hotline set up by MK Council, on (01908) 252570, or via their

website on www.mkweb.co.uk. Better still, if you know who the culprits are, ring Crime Stoppers on 0800 555 111 or via their website www.crimestoppers.co.uk.

Remember, graffiti is a criminal offence, punishable in law!

Fossils unearthed from the time when Linford was beneath the sea

Discovered by Parks Trust volunteers clearing quarry

Fossils that date from the time when the area was submerged under a shallow tropical sea have been found in the limestone quarry in Linford Manor Park.

It seems that the quarry is so rich in fossils that it has been designated an RIGS, or regionally important geological site.

The finds were made by Parks Trust volunteers while clearing some of the undergrowth to help expose the limestone beneath the soil in the quarry. Work is continuing but you can see how far the volunteers have got by visiting the spot, which is next to the standing stones in the

Manor Park. This sort of work is just one of the tasks volunteers have carried out within our parish this year. You may also have noticed Parks Trust teams coppicing the 'wilderness' area between the railway walk and canal, to encourage ground flora such as primroses to bring colour and richness to this peaceful site. The Trust has also been rehabilitating a number of ponds, including those at the brick kilns and at the end of Parklands, Great Linford.

CHARITABLE TRUSTS TO HELP YOU...

Charitable trusts are available to help individuals residing within the Parish area. The charities were set up many years ago and although they have limited funds they are still active and can provide some assistance to those in need.

The parish area includes the following grid squares: Great Linford, Giffard Park, Blakelands, Neath Hill, Pennylands, Bolbeck Park, Tongwell, Conniburrow, Downs Barn, Downhead Park and Willen Park.

As funds are restricted, the maximum amount that can be provided will not normally exceed £200. All applications received will be dealt with in strict confidence.

Great Linford Advancement In Life Charity

This Charity exists to give financial help to persons under the age of 25 years.

Grants are considered for educational purposes, to include social and physical training, scholarships or bursaries for entry to university or other educational establishments. This could include clothing, tools, musical instruments or books to help with the applicant's education, as well as assistance with travel in the furtherance of studies within an educational establishment.

Great Linford Relief In Need Charity

This Charity can provide some help to those within the Parish area, who are in severe financial difficulties and each case is taken on its merit. JS

Demand for facilities far outstrips availability

The Cricket Season is now over and again our pitches at Marsh Drive and the High Street, Great Linford have seen continuous use with five teams playing on a regular basis. The facilities at Marsh Drive now revert to football facilities, together with those at Pannier Place, Downs Barn. Unfortunately once again, the demand for football pitches exceeds the number of teams we can accommodate. We also have a problem with a shortage of facilities at Marsh Drive (three pitches and only three changing rooms).

The Parish Council would like to see this facility extended, but as always the funding needs to be obtained first.

The pavilions at the High Street, Great Linford and Downs Barn are available for hire. The High Street venue is suitable for meetings, and small children's parties. Downs Barn is on the first floor with an open staircase and is, therefore, unsuitable for the infirm or small children.

This is due to the inability of the pump to keep sufficient oxygen in the water (the pump was installed when the pond was built many years ago and was at the end of its life).

The Parish Council decided to replace the pump, but then the problems began. Despite many attempts, the electricity to the pond

THE STREET WHERE YOU LIVE...

Councillor David Stabler has unearthed some history relating to the refurbished barn, renamed “**Downs Barn Pavilion**” at Pannier Place.

This former barn was converted in the 1980’s by the Development Corporation to provide changing rooms and meeting facilities for the adjoining sports grounds. Presently the building and pitches are owned by Milton Keynes Council and are managed by Great Linford Parish Council.

Before development in Milton Keynes and subsequent civil boundary changes, the barn was in Willen Parish. In 1671 Dr Richard Busby, famous headmaster of Westminster School, classical scholar and grammarian but more notorious for beating his students, bought the Manor of Willen. Christopher Wren & Robert Hooke were his pupils. In 1695, on Dr Busby’s death, the Manor of Willen was bequeathed to

trustees who managed the estate for almost 300 years with little or no development, apart the necessary re-building of farms and cottages and the erection of a new school in 1847.

Of the outlying farm buildings on this site in Willen Parish, the barn is only survivor - it was re-built in 1829. A survey of the Willen estate in 1822 shows the western most fields of the Parish as “Upper and Lower Downs”, with the farm buildings located in the next field to the east called Upper Sampsons. The earliest reference to the name seems to be “The Downs” on a map of 1690. The 1950-54 Ordnance Survey marked and named the site as “Down’s Barn”.

Parish Manager Jenny Sharp lets off steam...

Parking at Junction of Glazier Drive and Fletchers Mews

Parking around the above junctions is incredibly dangerous, with vehicles parked right up to the turnings. May we remind those who park in this area, that you are committing an offence by parking in this dangerous manner. Those trying to exit Fletchers or Dyers Mews, have to pull into the middle of the road in order to see whether any vehicles are coming up or going down Glazier Drive. PLEASE before there is a serious accident, park in a safe manner (not on footpaths) well away from the junctions.

Motorcycles

Do your teenagers have a motorcycle; do you allow them to break the law by riding on redways and paths? We would like to remind all parents that motorcycles (miniature, full-sized and mopeds) must conform to the Road Traffic Act. This means that they require tax; insurance, MOTs and the riders require a driving licence and crash helmet. If your offspring causes damage to persons or property whilst riding these machines, then a compensation claim can be made against you.

Traffic near schools

We are still receiving a lot of complaints about the parking and general driving in the areas of schools. Great Linford Combined, St Monica's at Neath Hill and Giffard Park all have parents who park on the zig zag lines, let children out of cars on the traffic side of the road and in the case of St Monica's, park right up to the road junctions and across people's drives.

All this is totally unnecessary and very dangerous. Great Linford Combined and Giffard Park both have adequate parking in the nearby local centres; only laziness stops people using them. The speed of vehicles is also a huge worry – we are aware that the roads have a speed limit of 30 mph, but this is too fast when there are a lot of children around. Please look after other people's children drive or park very carefully in these areas. **JS**
