Chairman's Annual Report 2008-2009

This has been an interesting year for Eirwen Tagg as Parish Manager and me as Chair. The learning curve is not as steep as when we started in these roles last year.

The Great Linford Parish Council (GLPC) is one of the largest in Milton Keynes with almost 20,000 residents in just under 9000 dwellings.

Parish Councils are the first tier of elected representatives, and are governed by various Acts of Parliament. We are subject to a strict code of conduct on our activities and how councillors conduct themselves. We have 17 councillors on the Parish Council who deal with the activities of our two main committees, Finance and Planning, and Recreation and Environment.

We are statutory consultees for planning applications in the parish. In the past year we have discussed 110 applications and 65 have been agreed without comment. We commented on 38 applications, ten of which were refused planning permission by MK Council, eight were approved with conditions. Three were amended in line with GLPC comments and then approved. One application was withdrawn and ten are unresolved.

The aim of the parish council is to provide good cost-efficient services and this is reflected in our staffing and in the level of precept which is paid by residents in this parish – one of the lowest among urban parishes in the 'new city area.'

We manage good quality football pitches at Marsh Drive where 23 teams are active. Our cricket grounds are also in demand and maintained to a high standard. The football facility at Conniburrow has drainage problems and pitches have been unplayable. With funds from the closure of sports facilities at the former Gyosei School site, we have initiated a proposal, with the Conniburrow Community Association, to solve drainage problems, while making the site available for baseball and softball.

The parish is involved in the wider aspects of street care and we are now seeing an improvement in the standard of the grass verges and the grass cutting as a result of the change in the landscaping contractors. We also look forward to improved maintenance of all trees and shrubs.

The fouling of pavements and recreation areas is a major issue and we spend significant sums of money to prevent such nuisance by providing dog bins and bags. We also provide seats in

public places and have exciting plans to create a community orchard at Downs Barn.

There is great public anger at present over expense claims by politicians. GLPC councillors have again voted not to receive any payment for the time they give to the Parish Council. However, GLPC has agreed to pay for a taxi to and from council meetings, for those councillors who do not drive and have no other way of getting to meetings. The only reimbursement councillors can claim, with a receipt, is £30 per year for printing out agendas, minutes and supporting papers at home. This is a net saving on time, paper and first class postage.

Our financial position remains healthy as a result of careful planning and cost control. I thank staff and councillors for their contribution but especially Eirwen in her first year as Parish Manager in ensuring we follow best practice in terms of governance and risk assessment. This has been helped by Councillors David Stabler and Charles Allum who chair the two main committees and give unstinting service to the residents of Great Linford and the wider community.

COUNCILLOR PROFILE George Byfield



George's Lifetime of Service

George Byfield is one of Great Linford Parish Council's longest-serving parish councillors, and represents Conniburrow, along with Pauline Wallis and Joan Pickhaver. George has been serving the community in both MK and London for many years, as a councillor, resulting in the award of an MBE. He also became an Honorary Alderman of the London Borough of Southwark for his service as a councillor, before he and his family moved to Milton Keynes. He also has a Lifetime Achievement award for his work in the African-Caribbean Community, from the Racial Equality Council and Thames Valley Police.

George joined the RAF in his native Jamaica just after the outbreak of the Second World War. After the RAF he joined the 42nd Royal Tank Regiment (TA) and remained there for six years.

As well as a parish councillor, George is chair of the Conniburrow Community Association which manages the Community Centre that is used by many groups, including the Army Cadets, Senior Citizens, Adult Continuing Education (ACE) and for sports such as football and, in the not too distant future, baseball. The Centre also acts as a point of information for the residents and is also used for women's groups and as a school or Madrassa, by the Somali population and by many other groups. Community orchard blossoms!

Councillor Simon Teesdale tells how GLPC is preparing the ground for a winter start at Loriner Place Downs Barn.

Firstly, many thanks to one of our local Landscape Architects, Brian Mitchell, who donated his skill and time to produce the drawing above. Brian produced for the Parish Council a couple of drawings, so we had a choice of options, the above coming out on top. This was chosen because it shows the planting in a fan shape, which we can utilize to show the blossom moving slowly from one side to the other. This is to be achieved by planting trees on the westside that blossom early and on the east that blossom later. In this way we will increase the time the orchard is in bloom moving from one row to the next. This should keep the bees busy for several weeks, you will notice the area identified for hives in the top right hand corner.

Some grant funding secured, more needed

We have been fortunate to secure a grant from Milton Keynes Council for £3,500 to help us create the orchard. We have put in another grant with Waste Recycling Environmental Limited (WREN). WREN is a company limited by guarantee and a non-profit making Environmental Body (EB) registered to fund projects which are "eligible" under the Landfill Communities Fund. We will find out if our application has been successful later on in the year. We have estimated that the project will cost in total £17,000. The majority of the money is required to put in a pathway as shown above, that will allow both wheelchairs and pushchairs access to areas of the orchard.

Volunteers required in November

It is best to plant the fruit trees in November or early December so we will be looking for volunteers at this time. Shovels and wheelbarrows will be provided. Grants for art and allotments

Grants made recently by Great Linford Parish Council for community projects will help control graffiti, and make allotments even greener:

The Urban Art Academy has set up to engage young people suspected of 'tagging' and the incidence of graffiti is now almost zero. The group has

been asked to do the artwork for this year's Park Life Festival in Newport Pagnell, and a grant from GLPC for £250 will help towards the cost of materials.

Conniburrow Playing Fields should be a community resource providing sporting opportunities for both the adults and children of Conniburrow all year around. Unfortunately, after a few years without proper maintenance, due to lack of funding the football pitches are waterlogged and practically unusable in winter. There are no structured sports activities during the summer.

All of this is about to change after a Milton Keynes Council [MKC] decision in February, which transferred to Conniburrow, £320,000 of Section 106 funding from the Gyosei School redevelopment. This is to be used to level and drain the field, construct two baseball diamonds, a football pitch in phase 1 and then provide new quality changing facilities and a meeting room.

GLPC and MKC are now working with the Conniburrow Community Association [CCA] and BaseballMK to plan and develop the first phase over the next two years so that by 2012 Conniburrow will have an all year around sports field. From May to September, regular baseball practice will take place on weekday evenings, with

competitive games taking place most weekends. The field will have properly drained FA standard youth football pitch, which can be leased from CCA by local teams throughout the playing season from September 2012.

CONNIBURROW WILL HAVE RENEWED FACILITIES

“Everything CCA does is in the interests of ALL residents of Conniburrow. The baseball project and football pitch will provide activities for Conniburrow youth, the mid-age groups and older citizens will benefit from the fact that young people can be fully occupied. Conniburrow will have renewed facilities to last the life time of today’s and tomorrow’s community.”

Fewer victims of crime ...and offences fall

The annual crime figures for Milton Keynes - for the period of April 2008 to March 2009 compared to the previous year - shows that Great Linford Parish had a 25.8 per cent fall in crime, that is 91 fewer victims.

Of note, theft or handling stolen goods is down by 53.3 per cent with 56 fewer offences and robbery from a person is down 30 per cent.

Great Linford Parish has also seen a fall in the number of offences for violent crime, sexual offences, theft of vehicle, criminal damage and drug offences. Burglary has increased, with one more offence than last year and theft from vehicle has increased with three more offences.

Commander of police in Milton Keynes, Chief Superintendent Alan Baldwin, said: “What’s important to me and my team is the number of people that have been saved the ordeal of becoming a victim of crime. More than 90 fewer victims this year compared to last year is great news for residents of Great Linford Parish.”

...WE CAN MAKE MILTON KEYNES EVEN SAFER...

“Clearly there are areas where we can still improve and I am confident that by continuing to work with local people and our partners we can make Milton Keynes even safer than it is already.”

He added ‘There has been an increase in reports of both domestic abuse incidents and racially and religiously aggravated

crime. Whilst a rise is never a good thing, I strongly believe that the increase in reports demonstrates that victims of these crimes now have more confidence to come forward and report it to us, rather than suffering in silence. In Milton Keynes, we detect more racially or religiously aggravated crimes than anywhere else in the Force area, which demonstrates how seriously we take these offences. We also arrest nine out of ten perpetrators of more serious incidents of domestic abuse almost immediately. We will continue to work closely with our partners to support vulnerable victims and ensure that the perpetrators of these cowardly crimes are brought to justice.”

Top priorities for NAG

Following the survey consultation questionnaire to gauge residents’ concerns in News&Views 21, the reconstituted Neighbourhood Action Group [NAG] looked at the 169 responses received from across the parish area. The following top three priorities were agreed as those to be tackled first by the NAG.

- Litter and dog fouling - 53 responses.
- Landscape and general street maintenance - 31 responses.
- Parking issues - 27 responses.

Association has been formed and will oversee the layout of the site, obtain quotes for fencing, perimeter planting, gates, hard-standing for cars, water supply and site cultivation so that GLPC can get contractors on site as soon as possible.

The target is to have new plot holders on site in early 2010 on or before the annual contract renewal date of 1st April. Preference will be given to those living in Great Linford parish at the top of the waiting list.

Charles Allum GLPC Recreation Committee Chairman told News&Views.

“We have waited a long, long time to get this money allocated to provide more allotment plots. It is often frustrating for eager gardeners to be turned away because GLPC cannot offer them a plot. This will cut the waiting list and assist the community to grow their own vegetables in these difficult times.”

“Please go ahead and get an updated quotation. However, no more than £20,000 will be released for this project as this is all that has been allocated. When you have your final quotation, I can arrange for the funds to be released. When all is agreed it should not take more than a week or so to get funds moved in to the correct account for drawing on.” Spatial Planning Division Milton Keynes Council 7th May 2009

These are the words GLPC has been waiting to hear for over four years, since making an application for Section 106 developer funding from Stantonbury Park Farm. This was to enable GLPC to create at least 20 new allotments plots of around five poles each at the Sandy Close site off St Leger Drive.

Presently a grassed area owned by the parish council, the Sandy Close site is allocated for allotment plots in the MKDC master plan. However, due to a lack of interest in gardening it was never progressed, that was until all the 125 GLPC allotment plots were in use and a long waiting list built up, then GLPC acted to seek funding to begin the development process.

Completion early 2010

Residents of Marsh Drive and families driving young football players to the GLPC Marsh Drive sports ground will be delighted to know that indiscriminate weekend parking on the verges, in the road and the drive should be a thing of the past by the end of September.

After five years of badgering from the parish council, Milton Keynes Council has now found the funds to construct 50 new car parking bays on scrubland adjacent the two football pitches in the District Park. A boggy patch accessed through the gates off the drive will be transformed into a properly surfaced and lit parking area.

These new spaces will add to the existing 60 parking bays at Marsh Drive and 110 spaces should be sufficient to eliminate overspill parking in the road and access drive. As part of the scheme, surplus soil from the new parking bays will be used to form mounding along the verge of Marsh Drive to prevent vehicles driving onto the grass.

COUNCILLOR PROFILE

Colin Tripp

Colin's different perspective

Parish Councillor Colin Tripp sees life from a different perspective to many others. Colin, who is parish councillor for Giffard Park and Blakelands Ward, had a serious spine injury some years ago and is mostly wheelchair-bound. Seeing life from a sitting position is very different to how others see it, says Colin. And it's not just about eye or sight-levels, but people in wheelchairs can often be 'overlooked' and can seem to be invisible, he says.

Life at wheelchair level gives Colin valuable insight into the needs of residents who may have disabilities of one kind or another. He is able to use that knowledge as a parish councillor. 'When decisions are being made at the parish level, I can offer my experience. Other parish colleagues would not be aware how this will affect people with disabilities,' he says.

PARKING IS A PROBLEM

One of the great vexations for people in wheelchairs is parking. Colin's local shopping centre at Giffard Park, and outside the shops at Neath Hill have 'disabled bays' which are often taken by drivers who are obviously not disabled, says Colin. 'They just don't seem to appreciate how difficult it can be for people in wheelchairs. They may be able to park further away, but I can't, and often have to wait, sometimes for lengthy periods, while a disabled bay becomes vacant. And then invariably someone slips into the bay before I can get to it.' Colin can be contacted via the parish office on 01908 606613.

Are you a Parish Guardian?

Most parish residents tell us in they are concerned about litter, cigarette butts, graffiti, dog fouling, petty vandalism, abandoned or badly parked vehicles, and overhanging shrubbery. Those who report problems are what we think of as 'guardians of the parish'. They, along with GLPC staff are happy to take action and deal with the complaints they pass on. We want to work with these people!

However, we are aware of a growing number of residents – Parish Guardians – who take direct responsibility for some of the problems they see when out and about and either report the problem to the police or MK Council or try to find ways or sort the problems out themselves.

GLPC would like to thank those strollers, dog walkers and family groups who see litter and pick it up, or note the number of the nearest lamppost to dog mess or broken glass on the footway. As Parish Guardians you obviously care about your neighbourhood and give your support to the GLPC slogan Great Locality Proud Community.

COMMUNITY-MINDED

A recent example of direct action was a hardy group of youngsters who took the time to gather up newspapers that had been dumped in Great Linford. They decided it made sense to collect them all up ready for collection, rather than having them blowing all over the place. If ever there was a generous act of community

spirit, this was it, and certainly made them 'junior Parish Guardians.'

Taking control of our environment is something we all can do, as individuals or in groups who say, decide to give their area a clean-up (for which the parish can provide litter pickers!). Or maybe you want to contribute to the Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG). You don't have to join the NAG, but you can always give it feedback, or just be a spare pair of hands/eyes/ears. You can also make a difference by coming to the weekly Streetcare surgery held at the parish office (second Monday of each month at 10am) where you can talk to the MK Council officers about things that concern you. Speaking to a 'face' rather than an anonymous person on a telephone can be more successful and empowering. And talking to GLPC staff means that we can log your complaints and build up a picture about where problems are being caused and make sure they are put right.

POWER OVER YOUR ENVIRONMENT

Contributing in a positive way gives you power over your life and your environment and cuts out some of the frustrations that come about when we feel distanced from those whose job it is to make our lives better.

So why not call in to the parish office at 10 Tower Crescent or telephone Eirwen Tagg [606613] and tell her: - "I am a Parish Guardian and wish to help GLPC keep my neighbourhood clean and tidy." Eirwen will keep your details secure if you wish, but we will all be working together as a team to make all our lives better.

Parish website links the community

Where can you go to get a game of football or tennis? Or find a class to learn to paint or model, or a scout group for the kids. You may be new to the area, or looking for something new to take up. The Great Linford Parish Council website is a mine of information about community activities and a lot more besides. Everything's there, from finding out how to get an allotment plot, to planning a journey. But there's also some pretty down-to-earth information. For example, a resident who was starting up a business from home wanted to find out how many people lived on her estate. The answer was under Population Statistics, where a detailed breakdown is given about each of the communities that make up the parish area. Even more detailed information is available via the link to the Office for National Statistics.

ON-LINE FORUM

Oh, and if you want to get away from it all, you can also find out 'real time' train arrivals and departures from Milton Keynes Central station. Youngsters can link up to an online forum to express their views, you can learn how to get healthy and stay that way, discover what's on in MK, and even find a school for your child.

GLFC is now one of the largest football clubs in Milton Keynes, having grown from just six players sixteen years ago. The original Great Linford Hornets Football Club who played over 50 years ago and the Great Linford St Andrew's Scout Group colours inspired club colours - black and gold, reminding everyone it is a family

club, with roots firmly in the local community. Football though, it is not for the faint hearted child, as the training and matches carry on through the coldest winter weather, stopping only when the pitches are unplayable. Coats, scarves, and thoughts of warm sunny days at end of season matches are a must!

All ages and abilities can develop their skills.

Each season GLFC goes from strength to strength through the commitment of everybody dedicated to making it a community club, where footballers of all ages and abilities can develop their skills. Over the years, the teams have won a number of trophies, including Fair Play awards, reflecting the club's simple philosophy: 'enjoy yourselves!'

Though a popular club, GLFC try to accommodate new players whenever they can and the Under 5 and Under 6 squads are especially keen for new children join in - those currently in their first year at school, or starting

in September 2009. Those in the youngest age group learn about listening, plus teamwork alongside simple football skills. The improvement between September and June is amazing, why not pop along and see for yourself?

Downs Barn has a Multi Use Games Area equipped and marked out for a number of sports and you can play there, for free, on any evening or weekend. And in the not-too-distance future, you'll be able to add baseball to the list of sports available, at Conniburrow.

NOT JUST SPORT AVAILABLE

But you don't have to be sporty to enjoy our facilities. When not in use, the pavilions are available for community groups to hire. With no worry about parking and plenty of outside space, they are ideal meeting places. Both the Great Linford and Downs Barn Pavilions can accommodate groups of 30. They are regularly in use for educational/learning events.
